Nancy J. Dunlavy, Director:

Nancy Dunlavy worked as a reference librarian for over 25 years, first at the University of Minnesota and then at Honeywell. She has been a member of Soka Gakkai International, a socially engaged Buddhist community, since 1972. She has initiated community events at numerous venues in the Twin Cities metro area in relation to the Earth Charter, a Culture of Peace and other causes. She has been a delegate or officer of the Minnesota Alliance of Peacemakers since 2002, and currently serves as president of the Board of Citizens for Global Solutions, Minnesota. She has worked with the Workable World Trust since its inception in 2014, and now serves as its full time Director.



Mark Ritchie, Honorary Director:


Mark Ritchie, Honorary Director: Mark serves as President of Global Minnesota and he is a leader in the citizens committee working to bring a World's Fair to Minnesota focused on the health and wellness. Ritchie served as Minnesota's elected Secretary of State from 2007 to 2015 and as President of the Institute for Agriculture and Trade Policy from 1988 until 2006. In 2015 Ritchie was selected as the Endowed Chair in Sustainable Food Systems for the University of Minnesota. He is a graduate of Iowa State University and the Humphrey School of Public Affairs at the University of Minnesota.



Dr. Michael Andregg has a Ph.D. in genetics from the University of California, Davis, 1977. After studying monkeys in Morocco and doing research on genetic diseases at the University of Minnesota he concluded that war was a larger public health hazard than the rare diseases he worked on. He has taught in the graduate school at the U of MN for 34 years, but his main academic home is now the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul, where he has taught in Justice and Peace Studies and in the Aquinas Scholars Honors program for 24 years. His book **On the Causes of War** won a National Peace Writing Award in 1999. Michael ran an education non-profit for close to 30 years, Ground Zero Minnesota, which produced 57 educational videos and sponsored about 5,000 education programs on nuclear weapons and global sustainability issues. He has worked on intelligence reform, consults for recovering police-states, wrote a book on global demographics in 2014 and is co-author of a book on intelligence democratization in 2015, wrote chapters on intelligence ethics for Oxford UP and Routledge and is currently senior editor of a book to be published by a national intelligence agency titled "Intelligence Tradecraft for the Third Millennium."



Dick Bernard: After college, Army, and nine years of teaching junior high school social studies, Dick represented public school teachers for 27 years as a field representative for the Minnesota affiliate of the National Education Association. After retiring in 2000, and disappointed in the American response to 9-11-01, Dick became very active in the local Peace and Justice community, serving as President of the Minnesota Alliance of Peacemakers for three years, 2005-07. He has been active in Citizens for Global Solutions, Minnesota since 2003; has been an active blogger since 2009 (<http://outsidethewalls.org/blog/>), where he writes frequently on assorted topics.



Ron Glossop has served as Chair of the St. Louis chapter of World Federalist Association (WFA)/Citizens for Global Solutions (CGS) of Greater St. Louis since 1970. He was Vice-President of WFA 1998-2003 and has been a national board member of WFA/CGS for decades. Ron is Professor Emeritus of Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville (SIUE) where he taught philosophy courses for 35 years and served as Coordinator of Peace Studies for 25 years. He is author of **Confronting War** (4th ed. 2001) and **World Federation?** (McFarland, 1994) as well as **Philosophy: An Introduction to its Problems and Vocabulary** (Dell, 1974) and many articles in philosophy journals and Esperanto magazines. Ron is also



President of American Association of Teachers of Esperanto, Director of Infanoj ĉirkaŭ la Mondo [Children around the World], board member of UNA of St. Louis, Honorary Member of Rotary International, and member of other organizations such as the American Philosophical Association, Concerned Philosophers for Peace, Peace and Justice Studies Association, and so on.

Gail Hughes serves as the current President of the Minnesota Chapter of Citizens for Global Solutions. She is a member of the Grassroots Leadership Council of the Global Solutions national organization, where she also is a member of the Board. Gail is a part-time faculty member in Post-Secondary and Adult Education at Capella University, and has previously taught Global Studies, Sociology, and Interdisciplinary Social Science at St. Cloud State University. In earlier years, she was a program evaluator for the Minnesota Community Colleges, and served as a Peace Corps Volunteer in Lesotho.
